




Clean Brush Defined:

Clean Brush is limbs, large branches and other trimmings which can be too large for disposable containers. Yard Waste is grass clippings, leaves, tree trimmings, small branches, and/or other organic material suitable for either mulching or composting. Clean Brush and Yard Waste has value as a commodity and is converted to mulch at the Arlington Landfill. The mulch generated is utilized for landscaping, erosion control projects, and/or other beneficial uses.

- Shrubs
- Bag Leaves
- Paper Bags
- Brush Cart
- Large Tree Branches
- Tree Trimmings
- Grass Clippings

What's Different?

Brush/Bulk days now include Tuesdays. So, Brush/Bulk collection is on the 2nd, 4th, or 5th Tuesdays in North Grapevine, and Wednesdays in South Grapevine.

How to properly containerize Clean Brush - Brush piles need no container. However, loose material (e.g. leaves and grass clippings) must be in either a paper bag or a trash can style plastic container clean of any trash or refuse and weighing less than 50 lbs.

May I use plastic bags? For scheduled Brush/Bulk Tuesday or Wednesday.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

PREPARE!

Disaster preparedness begins with the individual and family. Your family members are an important part of your life and when disaster strikes, they are often first on your mind. Being prepared means helping to make every individual, regardless of age, understand the hazards faced, collect adequate supplies to sustain themselves until help arrives (up to 72 hours later or longer), and take action to strengthen the resiliency of your household and your community.

OUTDOOR WARNING SIRENS

The City of Grapevine operates fourteen solar-powered warning sirens to notify residents and visitors of potential hazards, weather, and other emergencies. The system is operated by the Grapevine Fire Department and sirens are strategically located throughout the City to provide alerts. Sirens will be sounded given one of the following conditions:

1. Tornado Warning impacting the City of Grapevine.
2. Tornado has been spotted by a trained weather spotter.
3. Severe Thunderstorm Warning with destructive winds in excess of 70 mph.
4. Hail 1.5 inch or larger in diameter.
5. Other threats that pose an immediate threat to safety



Sirens are tested the **1st Wednesday** of each month at **1pm** and are intended for those who are outdoors.

Watch

A watch is used when the risk of a hazardous weather or flood event has increased significantly, but the occurrence, location, and/or timing is still **uncertain**. It is intended to provide enough lead time so that those who need to take action, have enough time to do so.

What you should do:

- Remain alert for approaching storms
- Listen to local radio and TV for weather updates
- Be prepared to move to a shelter, if necessary

Warning!

A warning is issued when a hazardous weather or flood event **is occurring**, is imminent or has an extremely high probability of occurring. A warning is used for conditions posing a threat to life or property.

Safety is in Your Hands

Whether you're planting a tree, installing a fence, or beginning a construction project, contacting 811 is a critical first step. Every Dig Every Time — because safe digging starts with you.

Steps to Safe Digging

1. Call 811 at least three business days before you want to dig.
2. Utility lines are located and marked with color-coded flags.
3. Respect the flags by not digging close to them.
4. It's free. It's safe. And it's required by law.

RAIN & FREEZE SENSORS

Overnight lows are often below freezing this time of year. Water on sidewalks, roadways, and parking lots may turn to ice during these times, causing a hazard to pedestrians and drivers alike.



One of the biggest contributors of water to hard surfaces is irrigation overflow. Irrigation should not be conducted overnight or in the morning during this time of year to prevent any run-off from becoming ice and, in turn, a hazard.

Frost sensors for irrigation can be picked up at most local hardware stores to prevent activation of systems during freezing events. Also, any damaged sprinkler systems should be repaired as soon as possible to prevent excess water from leaving the property.



Consider xeriscaping. Xeriscaping is the use of drought tolerant plants that have low water requirements in your landscaping. These plants require little to no watering from irrigation and can survive the harsh conditions found here in North Texas.

The North Central Texas Council of Governments has also developed the Texas Smartscape program which promotes the use of both drought tolerant and native plants in landscaping. Native plants are adapted to North Texas conditions, and often have the added benefits of being both pest and disease resistant. Also, native plants attract native insects (including butterflies), birds, and other animals.



POOL DRAINING

This is the time of year when many Grapevine pool owners drain their pools in order to refill them with fresh water. Our Environmental Services staff reminds residents that pools should be drained to the sanitary sewer system and not to the street where it enters the storm drain system. Pool water discharged to the storm drain system may contain chlorine, have a low pH due to high acid content, and/or could contain high levels of algae (if the pool hasn't been maintained). It is also a potential problem when water that may not drain properly, or stands in areas which may provide habitat for disease carrying mosquitoes. All of these situations can have a detrimental effect on creeks, streams, ponds, and lakes that the storm-drain system discharges to, as well as creating a potential human health hazard.

Most residential pools in the city are plumbed to the sanitary sewer, generally through the filter backwash system. This allows the pool pump to drain the pool to the sanitary sewer. A garden hose may also be used to siphon water from the pool into residence's sanitary sewer cleanout. Additionally, pool backwash systems should not be rinsed to the street. Backwash materials should be collected, dried, and placed in the trash for disposal.

STORM WATER QUALITY

Management of storm water resources is governed by the Clean Water Act under the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System. The City of Grapevine's goal is to work in a cooperative teamwork spirit with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality, the United States Environmental Protection Agency (epa.gov), the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG), as well as all county and local governments to manage storm water quality concerns as effectively as possible.



STORM DRAIN MARKERS

The City has installed Storm Drain Markers on most of the curb storm drain inlets in the City. These markers are a constant reminder that whatever enters the inlet will eventually find its way to our creeks and lakes. Each marker details where the water goes, what watershed the drain is in, and supplies a phone number to report illegal dumping.

The only substance that should enter a storm drain is rain water. Remember, the storm drain system discharges directly to our local waterbodies and therefore, never reaches a water treatment plant.

Whatever enters our storm drains goes straight to the environment! Please protect our water quality. Report illegal dumping to our storm system by calling 817.410.3330.

Boating Tips



- 1. Bilge Pump:** Keep your engine well tuned to prevent fuel and oil leaks. Secure an oil absorbent pad or pillow in your bilge and under your engine where drips may occur.
- 2. Bilge Pads:** Check the pads often and do not let them clog the bilge pump. Dispose of them as hazardous waste at a marina or a local hazardous waste collection center.
- 3. Oil Change:** For oil changes, use an oil change pump to transfer oil to a spill-proof container. Wrap a plastic bag or absorbent pad around the oil filter to prevent oil from spilling into the bilge.
- 4. Fueling:** Prevent fuel spills by filling fuel tanks slowly and using absorbant pads or rags to catch drips and spills. Don't "top off" or overflow your fuel tank. Leave the tank 10% empty to allow fuel to expand as it warms.
- 5. Soap:** Never use soap to disperse fuel and oil spills. It is illegal and increases harm to the environment.
- 6. Maintenance:** If possible, save maintenance projects for the boatyard. When performing work on the water, minimize your impact by containing waste. Use tarps and vacuum sanders to collect all drips and debris for proper disposal.
- 7. Paints:** Minimize the discharge of heavy metals found in soft-sloughing antifouling paints by using a less toxic, or nontoxic antifouling paint. Use only non-abrasive underwater hull cleaning techniques to prevent excessive paint discharge. Remember, dry storage reduces the need for antifouling paints and saves money.
- 8. Household Hazardous Waste (HHW):** Dispose of paints, batteries, antifreeze, cleaning products, oil, oil filters, and other hazardous wastes at a hazardous waste collection facility or event.



DUSK/DAWN

Mosquitoes are most active during dusk and dawn, so try and stay indoors during this time. Use air conditioning or make sure there are screens on all doors and windows to keep mosquitoes from entering the home.



DRESS

Wear long sleeves and pants when outside.




LARVICIDE

Treat stagnant water that you cannot drain.



DEET - (N, N-diethyl-m-toluamide)


Use insect repellents containing DEET, the most effective active ingredient in repelling mosquitoes and other insects. Follow label instructions and always wear repellent outside.




DRAIN



Backflow Prevention Assemblies:

Test your assembly annually to keep irrigation lawn water out of your tap water.

WATER CONSERVATION

Water conservation is an important topic in North Texas due to the drought conditions the area has experienced during the last few years. Water is a vital and finite resource that must be managed to ensure that the region has enough supply for area residents, including plants and animals. The City of Grapevine promotes water conservation in its many forms.

Why conserve water? We need it! Conserving water also saves you money (through your water bill). Conserving water today will help ensure that there is water for tomorrow.

WATERING DAYS

If the City activates a Stage 1 Drought Contingency Plan, measures include limiting outdoor sprinkler and irrigation system watering to two times per week. Residential watering days are determined by whether the last digit of the address is even or odd.

Monday - NO WATERING ALLOWED


Tuesday & Friday - Non-residential locations (apartments, businesses, parks, common areas, HOA's)

Wednesday & Saturday - Residential addresses ending in an even number (0, 2, 4, 6, 8)

Thursday & Sunday - Residential addresses ending in an odd number (1, 3, 5, 7, 9)

Irrigation or watering of any lawn or landscape is prohibited between the hours of 10am and 6pm.

CONSERVATION TIPS

- Dishwashers typically use less water than washing dishes by hand.
- Designate one glass for your drinking water each day, or refill a water bottle. This will cut down on the number of glasses to wash.
- Soak pots and pans instead of letting the water run while you scrape them clean.
- Sparingly use the garbage disposal.
- Wash your fruits and vegetables in a pan of water instead of running water from the tap.
- Don't use running water to thaw food. Defrost food in the refrigerator.
- Install an instant water heater near your kitchen sink so you don't have to run the water while it heats up.
- Keep a pitcher of drinking water in the refrigerator instead of running the tap.
- Adjust your lawn mower to the height of 1.5 to 2 inches. Taller grass shades roots and holds soil moisture better than short grass. Dormant Bermuda grass needs water monthly. Aerate your lawn periodically. Holes every six inches will allow water to reach the roots, rather than run off the surface.
- Let your lawn go dormant (brown) during the winter. Dormant grass only needs to be watered every three to four weeks, less if it rains.
- Winterize outdoor spigots when temperatures dip below freezing to prevent pipes from leaking or bursting.
- Report broken pipes, leaky hydrants, and errant sprinklers to property owners, or your local water provider.
- Use a broom instead of a hose to clean patios, sidewalks and driveways, and save water every time.
- Know where your master water shut-off valve is located. If a pipe were to burst, knowing this could save gallons of water and prevent damage.





IRRIGATION SYSTEMS & BACKFLOW



As a homeowner, you are required to maintain your own irrigation system from leaking valves and broken sprinkler heads. It's also important to make sure the backflow prevention assembly (BFPA) is working properly by testing it on an annual basis by a licensed Backflow Prevention Assembly Tester. This will keep the lawn out of your sink.

AIR NORTH TEXAS

Air North Texas is a regional clean-air partnership and campaign to:

- Provide a comprehensive air quality resource.
- Promote a consistent regional air quality message.
- Leverage existing resources and program strengths in a collaborative effort.
- Increase public awareness of specific opportunities for residents to reduce emissions.
- Motivate residents to make clean air choices.

ENERGY SAVING TIPS

- Make sure the outdoor condensing coil is clean and free of grass and other debris. This will improve efficiency and also prevent costly equipment failures.
- Inspect doors and windows to ensure they are closing properly. A missing or torn weather seal can cause increased air infiltration, resulting in higher operating costs. Keep windows latched, as the locked mechanism frequently results in a tighter seal.
- Use the dollar bill inspection around doors. Close the dollar bill in each side and at several locations around the door. If the seal is working properly, you should feel firm resistance when you close the door and attempt to pull the bill free. No resistance indicates a defective door gasket.




PRETREATMENT OF WASTEWATER

Pretreatment of wastewater is private treatment or the "treatment" of wastewater before or prior to it reaching the City's collection system or Treatment Plant. Residents and businesses are encouraged to help ensure that the sewage (wastewater) that leaves your property and enters the City sewer has been properly managed to prevent private sewage from harming the sewer collection system, or Treatment Plant.

Specific Harmful Conditions include:

- Toxic materials that enter the sewer and kill the Treatment Plant.
- Flammable material that may cause an explosion.
- Grease, towels, plaster and material that may block the collection system.
- Corrosive material that harms the collection system.


SEWER SYSTEM OVERVIEW

FATS, OILS & GREASE

With the holiday season right around the corner, we are reminding those who will be cooking how to properly dispose of fats, oils, and grease (F.O.G.). FOG elements are the most common cause of sanitary sewer pipe clogs and backups.

Left over potato peels, cake batter, salad dressings, and other chunky or oily ingredients belong in the trash. If washed down the drain or garbage disposal, they cling to your kitchen pipes and can cause a back-up in your sink or an expensive call to the plumber.

Please help prevent blockages that may result in street flooding and water pollution by trashing or recycling all F.O.G. Remember, cooking oil can be recycled to make biodiesel, an alternative fuel source. The Environmental Collection Center, 6400 Bridge Street, Fort Worth, accepts used cooking oil, year-round.

SOLID WASTE (TRASH & GARBAGE)

A few quick tips for managing the solid waste you generate:

- Minimize the amount of waste you generate at the source.
- Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle.
- Place trash and recyclables curbside after 7pm or before 7am.
- Containerize trash and recyclables to prevent wind blown trash.

Do not place Trash or Recyclables curbside more than 12 hours in advance of scheduled service

CLEAN BRUSH DIVERSION PROGRAM

**1st & 3rd TUE or WED of the month:
(CLEAN BRUSH ONLY - RECYCLED)**

- Clean brush piles and yard waste: place yard waste, grass clippings, and leaves, in large “mulchable” paper bags or reusable yard waste containers (no plastic bags).
- Large piles of tree limbs and brush do not need to be bagged or bundled. All clean brush piles and clean yard waste collected on these days will be recycled.

**2nd, 4th & 5th TUE & WED of the Month:
(BULK & BRUSH - LANDFILLED)**

- Bulk & Brush (old furniture, appliances, carpet, tree limbs, and brush) will be collected on the above listed Tuesdays or Wednesdays.



BAG IT, DON'T BLOW IT

Leaf blowing done wrong has a negative impact on our health and the environment.

FLOODING:

- When an excessive amount of leaves are blown into the street they can cause stormwater drains to block and cause flooding conditions.

Poor Water Quality:

- When excessive amounts of leaves enter creeks, their decomposition causes depletion of oxygen in the water. Reducing good water quality and increasing the possibility of killing fish and other aquatic wildlife.

Batteries - Buy rechargeable batteries when applicable. Keep used batteries in a plastic container and dispose of them at a City recycling event or any Interstate Battery location.

Wrapping Paper - Use reusable gift bags or reuse gift wrap paper when possible. Tearable/Non-mylar wrapping paper may be recycled.

Packing materials - Use shredded paper when possible. Re-use styrofoam or recycle clean, white styrofoam at any City recycling event, or it may be taken to Altor Solutions at 900 Keller Parkway, Suite 101, Keller, 76248.

Cardboard - Cardboard boxes may be broken down and placed out for curbside recycling. Large amounts of cardboard may be brought to the Single Stream Recycling Container located in the Animal Shelter parking lot at 500 Shady Brook Drive.

Christmas Trees - Set live (naked/free of lights) Christmas trees out for Clean Brush pickup.


